## REPORT OF THE TRUST FUNDS

Danville, N. H. Year ending Dec. 31, 1992

Considering only those funds held for the entire year, the yield on investments for 1992 was 5.4%. This compares with 7.3% for 1991 and 8.5% for 1990. The drop in interest rates is having a serious effect on our income.

A new cemetery lot perpetual care fund was established for Louis Paolucci.

A contribution was made to the Florence Peterson Fund for the Colby Library Addition in the memory of Eliza Roberts.

A new scholarship fund for students of the Timberlane High School was set up in the memory of Brandon Swansen Rowe.

In addition to the annual payments of interest to the Town for cemetery care, the Timberlane Regional School District, the Old Meetinghouse Society, the Sanborn Library, and the Union Religious Society, \$768.75 was paid from the income of the Parsonage Fund towards the reshingling the roof of the Old Meetinghouse and \$38.82 was awarded to Erica Clark from the American Mechanics Citizenship and Patriotism Fund.

A partial payment of \$35,437.68 was made from the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Account for the new engine to be delivered in January, and \$8780.00 was added to the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Account.

As many of you know, the pipe supplying water from the Fire Association Hall to the library broke this year. After weighing the alternatives, it was decided that, rather than replace the pipe, the town would have a well drilled for the library. This was recently accomplished and the library now has operating bathroom facilities again. We apologize to anyone inconvenienced by our lack of water.

In closing, let me remind you that the library' is free to the residents of Danville and is presently open on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2:30 to 8:30, and on Saturdays from 10:00 to 2:00. See you at the library!

## WARRANT & BUDGET 1993

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Danville Fire Ássociation Hall in said Danville, on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March, next at 10:00 o'clock in the forencon to act upon the following subjects.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. (By ballot)
- 2. To choose all necessary School District Officers for the ensuing year. (By ballot)
- 3. To see if the Town shall adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from the assessed value of residential real estate for property tax purposes. This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year, for property tax purposes, from the assessed value on a residence to the value of \$15,000. (By ballot)
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows:

Amend Article VII, <u>General Provisions</u>, Section I., DRIVEWAY WAY PERMITS, by deleting the current section and replacing it with:

### I. DRIVEWAY PERMITS

"A driveway permit must be obtained from the Danville Road Agent before a building permit can be issued. In issuing the permit, the Road Agent will take the following into consideration:

A driveway grade that will allow the driver to bring the vehicle to a complete stop before entering the roadway and will permit a safe and controlled entry onto the roadway in all seasons of the year. Driveway grades in excess of ten percent (10%) need the approval of the Danville Building Site Review Committee.

The location of the driveway must provide adequate safe sight distances in both directions.

Water runoff from the driveway will not overload the roadway drainage system.

Adequate drainage fixtures for the driveway are installed."

## 5. Amend <u>Article II - Definitions</u> by adding the following: Q. ADULT MANUFACTURED HOUSING PARK:

A parcel or parcels of land on which are located more than two (2) units of manufactured housing wherein each unit is occupied by park rule by at least one person who has achieved the age of fifty-five (55) or older." (BY PETITION).

Amend <u>Article III - Zoning Districts and Boundaries</u> by adding the following:

## "F. ADULT MANUFACTURED HOUSING PARK ZONE:

That part of the Mobile Home Zone on Back Road being Map 2, Lot 11, Lot 13-3, Lot 13-1, Lot 14, Lot 15 and Lot 16." (BY PETITION)

Amend Article IV - Permitted Uses and Restrictions by adding the following:

## "F. ADULT MANUFACTURED HOUSING PARK ZONE:

(1) Permitted Uses:

- (A) Any use permitted in the Mobile Home Zone.
- (B) Adult Manufactured Housing Parks.

(2) Restrictions on Special Provisions:

(A) Adult Manufactured Housing Parks must comply with all requirements of Article V A A. (BY PETITION)

Amend <u>Article V</u> byadding the following: "(AA) Adult Manufactured Housing Parks:

(1) The provisions of Article V A 4, 6, 7, 8, and 9 are applicable. The provisions of Article V A 1, 2, 3, 5, and 10 are not applicable.

(2) No Manufactured Housing in such a park may be located within fifty (50) feet of the boundary line of a lot containing a

single-family residence.

(3) No Manufactured Housing may be located within thirty (30) feet of an existing public street, public right-of-way, or internal roadway.

(4) Each unit must be provided with a minimum lot size of 10,000 square feet with a minimum frontage of seventy-five (75) feet on a public street or an internal private roadway.

(5) Each unit shall have a minimum floor area of 820 square

feet excluding additions. Each unit must have a minimum of 150 square feet per occupant. (BY PETITION) (NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE PLANNING BOARD)

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for the use of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the town by tax collector's deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction, or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids, or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80:80.
- 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens upon real estate acquired by the Town as the result of the execution of the real estate tax lien by the Tax Collector for non payment of taxes.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95b, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept grants of Federal or state aid or both as may be available and to do all things necessary to carry out the purposes of this article.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property, other than cash, to the municipality for any public purposes. This authorization is in accordance with RSA 31:95—e and shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the Town Meeting.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the public Library Trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from state, Federal or other

governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year, in accordance with RSA 202-A;4-c.

13. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following provision concerning incompatible offices pursuant to RSA 31:39-a to prohibit municipal department heads from serving as at-large members of the budget committee.

Incompatible Offices. No Town department head, whether appointed or elected, shall serve as an at-large member of the budget committee. For purposes of this ordinance, the term "department head" shall include, but not be limited to, the animal control officer, fire chief, fire wards, librarian, police chief or road agent.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to allow Town property of Map 4, Lot 40, better known as the Murphy property, to be used as a community park/playground. With funds to be raised privately through donations to be appropriated by a private committee to erect a commercial community park/playground on said property. Once the community park/playground will then fall under the responsibility of the recreation department for upkeep and or expansion and repair. (By petition)
- 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000. (Forty Thousand Dollars) to pave Old Johnson Road and Huntington Hill Extension thru currently approved section. (By petition) (Not recommended by Selectmen)
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750. (Seven hundred and fifty dollars) to be used during 1993 to help support the Greater Haverhill Crisis Pregnancy Center. (Not recommended by Selectmen)
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000. (Twenty Thousand Dollars) to purchase new open-circuit self-contained breathing apparatus per NFPA specification one nine eight one (1981) 1992 edition, for the Fire Department, also to allow the Fire Wards to trade-in the present equipment to defray cost as may be in the best interest of the Town.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw up to \$9500.

(Ninety-five Hundred Dollars) from the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund and raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500. (Eighty-five Hundred Dollars) for a total of \$18,000. (Eighteen Thousand Dollars) to purchase and equip a new cruiser.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen/Police Chief to sell the 1987 Ford LTD Cruiser VIN #2FASP72G7HX212405 and the proceeds of the sale be placed in the existing Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund, such sale to take place within 60 (sixty) days of the new unit going into service.
- 20. To see if the Town of Danville will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400. (Four Hundred Dollars) as a contribution to the American Red Cross Seacoast Area Chapter. (Not recommended by Selectmen)
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650. in 1993 to assist Rockingham Counseling Center formerly Rockingham Child and Family Services, a private non-profit organization, which offers quality counseling services to our residents. (By petition)
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6400. (Sixty-four hundred dollars) to purchase new snow plows.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. (Five Thousand Dollars) to be placed in the Colby Memorial Library Capital Reserve Fund for future construction.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,300. (Eighty-Three Hundred Dollars) for the purchase of a computer package for the Colby Memorial Library. (The breakdown of costs for the computer package is as follows: \$5,500. for the required software and hardware and an additional \$2,800. for the estimated 400 hours necessary to enter the book and magazine information into the library data-base.)
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) and at the same time establish a new Capital Reserve Fund for future town-wide revaluation.

- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000. (EIGHT THOUSAND DOLLARS) to appraise and reassess all Mobile Homes, situated in Mobile Home Parks, in the Town, said re-assessments to be completed in time to be used in the computation of the 1993 Tax Rate. (By petition) (Not recommended by Selectmen)
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw \$2,000. (two Thousand Dollars from the Colby Town Forest Fund to be used to repair the Town Forest Road (also known as Tuckertown Road.)
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. (One Thousand Dollars) for repairs to the ball-field (known as the Kenneth R. Day Memorial Field) and withdraw these funds from the Recreation Capital Reserve Fund.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to eliminate curb-side recycling and institute a central drop-off recycling program. (Approx. savings \$22,000.00 a year)
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to open Rockrimmon Road, which was closed by Town Meeting in 1954, so that a developer may improve the road to meet or substantially meet all construction standards for proposed streets (including paving) as described in the Town's Subdivision Regulations, dated August 8, 1991, and any additional requirements that may be imposed by the Planning Board and/or Town Engineer. This approval will be in effect for two (2) years and the road will revert to a closed road unless substantial work has been accomplished, as verified by the Town Engineer. In this case, the approval will be extended for an additional two (2) years.
- 31. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before the Meeting.

1:00 p.m. on Saturday, March 13, 1993, at the Fire Association Hall.

#### PLANNING BOARD

The downturn in the New England economy is still evident in the reduced work load of the Planning Board. Most of the new lots created in Danville in 1992 came from a single subdivision. Four previously conditionally-approved subdivision permits were renewed and one such subdivision was denied renewal.

All the zoning changes recommended by the Planning Board passed at the 1992 Town Meeting. The members of the Planning Board would like to take this opportunity to thank the residents of the Town for their support in the past and hope for their continued cooperation and support.

This year there are two proposals for zoning changes/additions. The first proposal deals with the maximum grades for driveways. The second, submitted by petition, seeks to establish an Adult Mobile Home Park Zone and an Adult Mobile Home Park. The Planning Board, after holding a public hearing and carefully reviewing the petitioned article, felt that this was an almost textbook illustration of spot zoning and, therefore, cannot recommend passage of this proposal.

The Planning Board has reviewed the Soil Type Lot Sizing Model Ordinance and, using a simple math model of its provisions, applied it to the types of soils commonly found in Danville. The result was that the lot size calculation approaches the current lot size. The Planning Board will continue its review of the model ordinance to determine its suitability to the needs of Danville residents.

#### ANIMAL CONTROL DEPARTMENT

The Animal Control Department was once again very busy this past year. We have had calls from barking dogs to a bear hit by a car.

We try to do the best job we can and try to be fair in the way we do it. In some cases owners of dogs ignore our warnings and continue to let their dogs run loose. These people will now be facing other charges and possible court action. We will be forced to pick up the dogs and hold them at the owners' expense until all fines and pickup fees are paid and/or court action is taken.

Please do not let your children play with any stray dog or cat—they may look healthy but could be carrying rabies. If your own animals have been or/are running at large they may be carrying the saliva from a rabid animal on its coat and that makes them very contagious. Your pets should be given a bath and dried thoroughly before any children play with them. Also when washing them please use good plastic gloves for your own protection.

You should get all your animals their rabies shots. If you own animals other than cats and dogs contact your vet for info as to who does or doesn't need the rabies shots.

State laws say that any law officer may go house-to-house and check for rabies certificates for all your dogs and cats.

Please be very careful with any animal that does not appear to be acting right—there is a large—scale epidemic of rabies in the United States and it is not only raccoons that are infected but many other types of animals—large and small.

I believe the increased visibility is at least partly responsible for the decrease in the incidence of burglary in 1992 over 1991 (Approximately 50%).

The Plaistow Area Transit Advisory Committee (PATAC) continues its work to bring commuter service to the area and to restore commuter rail service to N. H. Area towns' representatives have worked diligently with State Dept. of Transportation Officials, the Rockingham Planning Comm., the Merrimack Valley Planning Comm., the Mass. Bay Transit Authority and Guilford Transportation Co. In addition, the Coach Co. of Plaistow and the

In addition, the Coach Co. of Plaistow and the F. R. Harris Co. of Boston, have worked closely with PATAC and with each other in planning for a large, multi-modal transportation center in Plaistow, where residents can board buses or trains for points south—toward Boston and beyond. It is expected that such a center will be in operation within a year to serve the people of this area.

In December, PATAC hosted a fund-raiser with a holiday multi-modal trip to Boston---passengers drove to the Bradford MBTA station in Haverhill, Ma., where they boarded a train into North Station in Boston. If all goes well, there will be both commuter bus and rail service this year, and the high-speed passenger trains between Boston and Portland, Me. will be familiar sights to area residents.

PATAC meets on the last Tuesday of each month on a rotating basis in member towns.

PATAC thanks residents of member towns for their continued support and input, and we welcome everyone to our meetings.
