

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OUR DEDICATION TO CLAIRE MACE

One of the tasks she became very familiar with was producing the Annual Town Report. During that time she also served as Assistant Treasurer from time to time and is presently serving in that position.

Other responsibilities included organization of the Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets and toys and gifts for needy children. She was a driving force behind starting the food pantry.

Claire was involved in bringing the Town into the 20th century, with the introduction of a computer system for the Town's bookkeeping. She was certain that she would never be able to learn this new method of what she always did manually, but of course, she did.

Claire enjoys summering at their cottage on Sebago Lake in Maine and retirement has given her the pleasures of uninterrupted vacations there with her husband Bill. TRUSTEES OF THE TRUST FUND - 1994 REPORT

Considering only those funds held for the entire year, the yield on investments for 1994 was 3.6%. This compares with 4.0% for 1993 and 5.4% for 1992. Interest rates seem to have bottomed out and perhaps next year will be a bit more profitable.

New cemetery lot perpetual care funds were established for:

Evelyn C. and Sanford M. Harlow Phillis Ellyson John J. Lane, Jr.

\$20,000 voted at the March town meeting was added to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Account.

A capital gain of \$278.86 for Common fund #1 was received from our investment in the Vanguard Windsor II Mutual Fund.

This year the trustees took over management of eight Timberlane Regional High School scholarship funds.

We also received another of the funds set up in 1947 by Lester A. Colby. This is a school aid fund with a principal of \$13,659.40. The income from this fund will go toward Danville's school costs along with that from the March and Eaton funds.

\$813.75, the income from the Eaton and March Funds, was paid to the Timberlane Regional School District towards Danville's share of the school costs.

We are now managing 119 cemetery care funds, 27 trust funds, and 5 capital reserve accounts for a total of 151.

WARRANT AND BUDGET 1995

To the inhabitants of the Town of Danville in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Danville Fire Association Hall in said Danville, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. (By ballot)
- 2. To choose all School District Officers for the year ensuing. (By ballot)
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: (By ballot)

Article II. Delete Section O., RECREATIONAL VEHICLE/CAMPING TRAILER and replace with:

O. RECREATIONAL VEHICLE/CAMPING TRAILER

Recreational vehicle means any of the following vehicles:

- a. Motorhome or van, which is a portable, temporary dwelling to be used for travel, recreation and vacation, constructed as an integral part of a self-propelled vehicle.
- b. Pickup camper, which is a structure designed to be mounted on a truck chassis for use as a temporary dwelling for travel, recreation and vacation.
- c. Recreational trailer, which is a vehicular, portable structure built on a single chassis, four hundred (400) square feet or less when measured at the largest exterior horizontal projections, calculated by taking the measurements of the exterior of the recreational trailer including all siding, corner trim, molding, storage space and area enclosed by windows but not the roof overhang. It shall be designed primarily not for use as a permanent dwelling but as a temporary dwelling for recreational, camping, travel or seasonal usage.
- d. Tent trailer, which is a canvas or synthetic fiber folding structure, mounted on wheels and designed for travel, recreation, and vacation purposes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: (By ballot)

ARTICLE IV., PERMITTED USES AND RESTRICTIONS, delete Section A.3.e.2)b and replace with:

- b. The primary access road entering the development shall have one hundred (100) foot frontage, fee simple interest on a Class I through Class V roadway, with a fifty (50) foot wide right-of-way conforming to Town street standards plus a twenty-five (25) foot buffer on each side. Internal roadways shall conform to Town street standards.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: (By ballot)

ARTICLE IV., PERMITTED USES AND RESTRICTIONS, delete Section A.3.e.4)b. and replace with:

b. Subtract the area of all wetlands as defined by the Danville Wetlands Ordinance.

ARTICLE IV., PERMITTED USES AND RESTRICTIONS, delete Section A.3.e.4)c. and replace with:

- c. Wetlands soils may be added to the usable tract as follows. The amount of wetlands soils to be added back must be equal to the smaller of either: the usable tract after subtracting a. and b. above; or the area of wetlands soils.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: (By ballot)

ARTICLE IV., PERMITTED USES AND RESTRICTIONS, delete Section A.3.e.5)a.1 and a.2 and replace with:

- 1. Front setback. No structure or parking area shall be within one hundred fifty (150) feet of a public right-of-way.
- 2. Side and rear setback. No structure or parking area shall be within one hundred (100) feet of any abutting property line.

ARTICLE IV., PERMITTED USES AND RESTRICTIONS, delete Section A.3.e.5)b.2. and replace with:

2. Structures shall be at least thirty (30) feet apart on all sides.

7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: (By ballot)

ARTICLE V., SUPPLEMENTAL REGULATIONS, replace. A. MOBILE HOME PARKS with:

A. DEFINITIONS

- 1. Common Space: Common space is that portion of the tract, exclusive of the area needed for streets and utilities and the individual dwelling units within the cluster subdivision, which shall be set aside for the benefit and enjoyment of the subdivision property owners. The area may contain accessory structures and improvements necessary and appropriate for the educational, recreational, cultural, social, or other non-commercial needs, as well as any utility services utilized by the owners of the common area, or may be open space as defined in this section. The common area may not consist principally of land difficult to utilize.
- 2. Open Space: Land not built upon, which must be permanently kept in that condition.

ARTICLE V., SUPPLEMENTAL REGULATIONS, change A., MOBILE HOME PARKS, to B.

ARTICLE V., SUPPLEMENTAL REGULATIONS, delete Section A.1. and replace with:

- 1. Setback and Buffers: Structures may be located in any manner on the site provided that the following standards are met:
 - a. External Setbacks:
 - 1. Front setback. No structure or parking area shall be within one hundred fifty (150) feet of a public right-of-way.
 - 2. Side and rear setback. No structure or parking area shall be within one hundred (100) feet of any abutting property line.
 - b. Internal Setbacks:
 - 1. Front setback thirty (30) feet from edge of internal roadways.
 - 2. Structures shall be at least thirty (30) feet apart on all sides.
 - c. Landscape Buffer:
 - 1. A Mobile Home Park shall have a twenty-five (25) foot landscape buffer to provide an adequate transition between abutting land uses and existing Town roads. Whenever possible, the natural vegetation shall be retained.

ARTICLE V., SUPPLEMENTAL REGULATIONS, delete Section A.2. and renumber Sections 3. through 10.

ARTICLE V., SUPPLEMENTAL REGULATIONS, delete Section A.5.b., and replace with:

- b. That the total land area of the mobile home park shall contain at least one (1) acre of land for each mobile home. Determine the acreage of usable tract area by taking the gross tract acreage and:
 - 1. Subtract the area of all easements, roadways and utilities.
 - 2. Subtract the area of all wetlands as defined by the Danville Wetlands Ordinance.
 - 3. Wetlands soils may be added to the usable tract as follows. The amount of wetlands soils to be added back must be equal to the smaller of either: the usable tract after subtracting 1, and 2, above; or the area of wetlands soils.
 - 4. Divide the usable tract area by one (1) to determine the number of total dwelling units.

ARTICLE V., SUPPLEMENTAL REGULATIONS, delete Section A.5.c. and replace with:

c. That each mobile home be placed on a lot with a minimum size of at least 10,000 (ten thousand) square feet which must be dry.

ARTICLE V., SUPPLEMENTAL REGULATIONS, delete Section A.1.e. and replace with:

e. Minimum Open Space: The open space for all cluster developments shall not be less than twenty-five (25) percent of the gross land area of the development. No more than fifty (50) percent of the open space land shall contain wetland soils as defined by the Danville Wetlands Ordinance. The Planning Board reserves the right to determine the appropriateness of the layout of the open space.

ARTICLE V., SUPPLEMENTAL REGULATIONS, delete A.1.f. and renumber A.1.g. and A.1.h. to A.1.f. and A.1.g.

ARTICLE V., SUPPLEMENTAL REGULATIONS, delete Section A.1.h. and replace with:

h. Minimum Common Space and Lot Size: For a cluster development without interior lot lines, the common space need not be delineated on the plan. Its area shall be calculated as ten thousand (10,000) square feet per dwelling unit, excluding dwelling units and roads. For a cluster development with interior lot lines, the square footage of the individual lots, excluding the dwelling unit on the lot, can be subtracted from the ten thousand (10,000) square feet to meet the common space requirement.

8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: (By ballot)

Excavation and/or removal of earth is not permitted in the Town of Danville, unless a special exception is obtained from the Board of Adjustment. If a special exception is granted, then the proposed excavation will be conducted to a depth not greater than three (3) feet above the seasonal high water mark. In order to obtain this special exception, the following procedure must occur.

9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: (By ballot)

ARTICLE IX., ENFORCEMENT, change Section 3.a to read:

Building permit fees will be set by the Board of Selectmen. No building permit shall be required for construction costing five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or less. The permit fee shall include the cost of the inspection except that an additional fee, as set by the Board of Selectmen, shall be charged where re-inspection is required to a revision or rejection.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw the sum of \$22,000 (Twenty-two Thousand Dollars) from the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 (Twenty Thousand Dollars) for a total of \$42,000 (Forty-two Thousand Dollars) to purchase fire apparatus that will be placed on the "new" forestry vehicle. (Recommended by Selectmen)
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen/Fire Wards to sell the 1952 GMC 6X6, VIN No. 17928 and the proceeds of the sale be placed in the existing capital reserve fund for future fire truck purchases. (Recommended by Selectmen)
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500 (Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars) to be added to the existing Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$3,000 (Three Thousand Dollars) for the lease/purchase of a copy machine for the Police Department. (Recommended by Selectmen)

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 (Five Hundred Dollars) in 1995 to assist Child and Family Services of NH, formerly Rockingham Counseling Center, a private non-profit organization, which offers quality counseling services to our residents. (By petition) (Not Recommended by Selectmen)
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 (Six Hundred Dollars) for the purpose of helping to defray the cost of services provided to the Town of Danville and its residents by Area Homemakers.

(By petition) (Not Recommended by Selectmen)

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 (Five Thousand Dollars) to be placed into a conservation fund as authorized by RSA 36-A:5: said fund to be administered by the Danville Conservation Commission primarily for, but not limited to, the following purposes:
- 1. Provide for the organization, assembly and annual update of a file that contains as much information as possible on the deed survey, tax map, subdivision or site plans, minutes of any Town meetings concerning the parcel, pages from town histories that mention the land, and any other information available. Such parcels of land shall also be clearly identified on a topographical map of the Town.
- 2. Provide funds for land acquisition for recreation (such as a Town trail system) and conservation purposes.
- 3. Provide for education of Danville citizens on existing and future conservation laws, rules and methods.

(By petition) (Not Recommended by Selectmen)

17. To see if the Town will vote to require that the Selectmen, before disposing of real property, the title to which has been acquired by Tax Collector's deed, first consult with the Conservation Commission, said Commission to recommend whether or not the retention of such real property would be in the best interests of the Town as provided in RSA 80:42-a, subject to final ratification of the next annual or special Town meeting.

(By petition) (Not Recommended by Selectmen)

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 (Six Thousand Dollars) to be added to the Library budget.

(By petition) (Not Recommended by Selectmen)

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 (Thirty Thousand Dollars) for the purpose of expediting the installation of traffic signal lights at the intersection of Routes 111 and 111A in Danville in 1995. Said sum is to be added to an appropriation of \$80,000 (Eighty Thousand Dollars) from the State of New Hampshire, for a total cost of \$110,000 (One Hundred Ten Thousand Dollars) for the installation of said traffic signal lights.

(By petition) (Recommended by Selectmen)

- 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to utilize the property of Map 4, Lot 40, better known as the Murphy property or any other Town property for the construction of a community park/playground. (By petition) (Recommended by Selectmen)
- 21. "To see if the Town will vote to amend Article No. 23 passed at the 1982 Town Meeting to nominate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend the funds for purposes of constructing a playground." Article No. 23 passed as amended as follows, "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 (Five Thousand Dollars) to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the development of future recreational facilities. The amendment deletes the words "the purchase and" from the original article." (By petition) (Recommended by Selectmen) (2/3 vote required)
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept Cub Pond as a Class 5 Road. (By petition) (Not Recommended by Selectmen)
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following as a Town ordinance as authorized by RSA 31:39a. "An elected Town official shall not be eligible to hold office if said official is delinquent by more than thirty days in paying property taxes on time. This ordinance shall exempt affected officers and employees who are in office or employed at the time the ordinance is adopted for a period not to exceed one year from the date of adoption."

(By petition) (Not Recommended by Selectmen)

- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$27,000 (Twenty-seven Thousand Dollars) to fund the salary increases as proposed by the Wage and Salary Committee, effective April 1, 1995. (By petition) (Recommended by Selectmen)
- 25. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

26. To transact any other business that may legally come before the Meeting.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN - 1994 REPORT

In calendar year 1994, three leading causes of fires were no permit, children and rekindles of fires which were not properly extinguished.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000. and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Fire officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department as a permit is needed to kindle a fire in Danville year round. This helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

We are very pleased to tell everyone, that we now have a boat and a new motor for use in the forest fire season, as well as for use by the fire/rescue department, as needed.

Circulation increased. Over 7500 items were borrowed. That is a 46% increase in two years. 5,885 patrons used the library. 570 books, 27 videos, and 20 audio cassettes were added to the collection.

Children's programming continued to meet with enthusiastic support. This year's Summer Reading Program was entitled "Go Undercover With Books". We had two performances. Our kick-off program was a puppet show. A magic show was the perfect ending. Over one hundred people attended each performance.

FIRE DEPARTMENT - 1994 REPORT (continued)

We are happy to announce that our efforts to acquire a newer military chassis have been successful. We have received a "Mack" ten ton 6X6 that is in exceptionally good condition, thru D.R.E.D Division of Forest and Lands.

At this time the department is removing the military specialty equipment and preparing the chassis for acceptance of the fire apparatus. As mentioned in last year's report, we are looking to purchase an "apparatus body/tank assembly that will be "rust, rot and corrosion" proof as possible. It will be of modular construction to allow easy transfer to another chassis in the future if needed. By using some existing equipment and in house labor as capable and with a withdrawal from the capital reserve fund the impact will be minimal for such a capable unit.

In reference to the new "carbon monoxide" (CO) detectors that are now on the market. This department is taking the position that they are worthwhile devices. To date every call for an alarm (CO) has been a true alarm. The "war stories" of their faulting do not prove them to be unreliable, case in point - when these units went on sale in the Chicago area last summer, the fire department received over 2300 calls. The truth of the situation was that on that day there was an "inversion" in effect and the environment agencies had warned of unfit air for breathing. The CO detectors only proved that, yes it was a day of bad air. As a point of interest, one evening a few weeks ago there were seven victims of carbon monoxide poisoning in the Parkland Hospital Emergency Department, all from one building in the area with a malfunctioning furnace.

PLANNING BOARD - 1994 REPORT

1994 was an extremely busy year for the Planning Board. In addition to reviewing subdivision submissions, the Board proposed, and ultimately approved, what has demonstrated to be a significant change in the subdivision regulations regarding curbing and sidewalks. Although the Board has not been presented with a subdivision it feels would require curbing and sidewalks, by having the ordinance in place, developers now must ask for waivers to the Ordinance. In granting the waivers, the Planning Board asks the developers for considerations in

return. These considerations have been in the form of recreational facilities, hiking trails and road repair work, which has saved the Town many thousands of dollars in potential expenses this year alone.

This past year also marked the start of an effort to update the Master Plan and the Capital Improvements Plan. Both of these documents will be completed in 1995.

The Planning Board spent a considerable amount of time reviewing the Zoning Ordinance. As a result, several changes were made, primarily to clear up some ambiguous wording and to clarify intent.

The Planning Board was very encouraged to see the number of interested citizens participating in our meetings and public hearings. Many of the ideas and concerns of those citizens attending the meetings directly influenced our decisions regarding subdivision issues. Those same ideas and concerns help shape the direction of the Town through the planning process; therefore we encourage all citizens of Danville to attend Planning Board meetings whenever possible.

SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE - 1994 REPORT

The Solid Waste Committee will miss the support and enthusiasm that Mike Weston brought to the committee, his new ideas on recycling and trash disposal. Mike's influence and hard work helped make Danville one of the first towns in New Hampshire to have a recycling program. He will be missed.

This year the Solid Waste Committee started the household hazardous waste disposal weekend in October by participating in the regional program with the towns of Plaistow, Newton, Kingston, East Kingston, Hampstead and Atkinson. We plan to continue this program annually.

Drop off recycling program continued for a second year with a savings of approximately \$20,000, in comparison to curbside recycling. Because some Town residents have expressed the desire to return to curbside, a survey of Town households was conducted before the March, 1995 Town Meeting. Survey results will be announced on that day.

A Spring clean up was conducted in May where residents could dispose of non-hazardous bulk materials, appliances, oil and antifreeze. A swap area was provided for residents to take useable items home.

The committee also conducted a recycling awareness function at the school. A recycling booth at the May Day Fair is one example of this effort.
